coming up Nov. 17-21, 2009 in Hartford, CT, at the National Association for Interpretation (NAI) national workshop.

Enjoy New England in the fall through the many and varied off-site sessions.

Some of the sessions include: Step Back in Time: Visit 1800s New England, a trip to Old Sturbridge Village, a “must-do” experience of early life in New England from 1790 to 1840. Another option is the Roger Williams Park Zoo, one of the oldest zoos in the country, with more than 150 species and over 1000 animals. A third option is 18,000 years of Native and Natural History at the Mashantucket Pequot Museum and Research Center, an award-winning, state-of-the-art complex. Also available is Classic New England Charm: Mystic, Connecticut. This off-site will take you to the Mystic Aquarium, where you will have the chance to reach and touch a ray, or go beak-to-nose with a penguin, and then off to Mystic Seaport, where you can immerse yourself in a 19th century maritime village, and take a behind-the-scenes tour of the 1841 whaling ship, the Charles W. Morgan.

For those who love science, you won’t have to travel at all to fall in love with the new Connecticut Science Center, located adjacent to the Connecticut Convention Center. Christine Murphy of the Boston Globe started a review of the site with, “The minute I caught sight of the wavy roof that seems to hover over the Connecticut Science Center like a silver magic carpet, I knew this was no ordinary museum.” She goes on to talk about the 150 hands-on exhibits in this eco-friendly building. Lewis and Clark National Historical Park invites you Saturday, Sept. 26, 2009 to roll up your sleeves and grab your kayak or canoe for an afternoon of fun and work.

Join the park staff on National Public Lands Day for a boat paddle and invasive plant pull on the Lewis and Clark River. The event runs from 3 to 6 p.m. Not only is this a chance to learn about the natural and cultural history of the river, but it is an opportunity to learn about the plants that grow along our riverbanks. This is a chance to do some “hands-on”good, as well as to explore your backyard.

You can bring your own kayak/canoe or use the park’s watercraft, by reservation. Bring gloves and clothes that you don’t mind getting wet and muddy and be prepared to work for one to two hours. If you don’t have a canoe or kayak we ask you to register for a shift. Just call the park at (503)861-4425 to sign up. Children must be nine years of age or older and accompanied by an adult.

All participants must wear personal floatation devices, sign liability waivers and volunteer agreements. Prizes will be awarded for the WACKIEST plant hat and for the most weeds pulled. Meet at the canoe launch site at Netul Landing just south of Fort Clatsop anytime between 3-4:30pm.

Re-Visioning This Place: Chinookan Communities on the Lower Columbia River

Saturday, September 19

10:30 A.M. – 3:30 P.M.

Columbia River Maritime Museum in Astoria, Oregon

Imagine a time when Chinookan communities dominated the landscape, canoes plied the Columbia River, and its tributaries, and the Chinook controlled trade into the interior. In the nineteenth century, canoes connected the Chinookan people to a complex world of trade through the coast's many estuaries and rivers, and became renowned worldwide for their beauty and craftsmanship. With canoes as a focus, family friendly presentations by Native and non-native historians will provide insight into the role the Chinook played in early international trade. A traditional canoe will be on display outside the museum.

Opening ceremonies begin at 10:30 a.m., followed by presentations and family activities. Historian, archaeologist, and author, Ken Ames, will discuss historically significant but altered communities along the Columbia River. Chinook Nation members, Sam Robinson and Charlie Funk, will introduce visitors to traditional and contemporary Chinookan culture. A dialogue about the importance of canoes will be enhanced by viewing a Native canoe on display in the museum. The event includes carving demonstrations, singing and drumming. Children's activities include hands-on crafts to take home.

This program is sponsored by the Center for Columbia River History with the Columbia River Maritime Museum through a grant from the Oregon Council for the Humanities.
